

Murray School District and Dublin Unified School District Chronology

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Note: The following information was drawn from multiple sources, many of which can be found in the Alameda County Library, Dublin Branch. It is a work in progress. Local history, especially Dublin's history, can often have conflicting information and dates. Since much of this information came from newspapers which often relied on only one or two people's recollections, please understand that some information might not be accurate. This chronology also includes the year other, non-public, schools opened in Dublin, in order to describe the larger context of Dublin's education history.

1854 – Murray school started as the first school in eastern Alameda County. Charles Crane started teaching in the old Francisco Alviso adobe (Foothill Road, Pleasanton).ⁱ

1856 – Murray school may have opened on Flanagan Road, near what is now Stoneridge Mall.

1860 – Murray school moved from Flanagan Road to the Dublin-Hayward Road. This is now known as Dublin Canyon Road.

1866 – Local residents formed the Murray School District.

1869 – Murray School house opened. It was the first school in Alameda County's Murray Township after the state's formation.ⁱⁱ

1870 – Dublin had two hotels, a general store and a wagon shop, a black smithy and a shoemaker shop in addition to a church and school.

1874 – John F. Jordan taught at Murray school.ⁱⁱⁱ

1880 – Murray school had 87 students. Murray Township had 1,414 students.^{iv}

1882 – Murray school teacher Charles Jefferson Thom taught 94 students. Murray Township had 1,340 students.^v

1884 – According to the Livermore Herald: "The public school is well patronized, and has nearly seventy pupils, with C. J. Thom as teacher. The Trustees are J. C.

McDermott, Clerk of the District, Rod. Fallon and Wm. Martin, gentlemen well qualified to protect the school interest.”^{vi}

1911 – A small part of eastern Murray School District became the Antone School District. That district built a small one room school house later that year to take care of children living along Tassajara Road and in the area on both sides of the border with Contra Costa County.^{vii}

1914 – A library opened in the general store.^{viii} Dublin had two hotels, two stores, shops, a school, and a church.^{ix}

1921 – Murray school housed the local branch of the Alameda County Library.^x

1934 - Dublin had a school, a church, two hotels, a grocery store, a blacksmith shop, five gas stations and a library. Dublin Boulevard, then part of the Lincoln Highway (later Highway 50), had businesses on both sides of the street.

1944 – Murray school used as a registration location for war ration book distribution.^{xi}

1952 – Newly constructed Murray school opened on Dublin Blvd. The original school house was considered inadequate sometime before this.

1961 – Dublin Elementary School opened.

1963 – Brighton Elementary School opened.

1964 – Fallon Elementary School and Village Elementary Schools opened.

1965 – Nielsen Elementary School opened.^{xii} Village Elementary School closed.^{xiii}

1966 – The third version of Murray Elementary School opened in January.^{xiv} The Valley Community Services District received the previous school building on Dublin Blvd. for use as a recreation center. Nielsen School opened. Brighton Elementary School closed.^{xv}

1967 - C. F. (Christen Hansen) Fredericksen School opened.^{xvi} Lydiksen School opened.^{xvii}

1968 - Bescoe Elementary School opened.^{xviii} Dublin High School was established in the fall of 1968 as the second high school in Pleasanton. It was part of the Amador Valley High School District.^{xix}

1969 – J. R. Cronin Intermediate School opened.^{xx} Dublin High School opened on Village Parkway.

1970 - The Dublin Public Library moved into new and larger quarters on Village Parkway.^{xxi} Bescoe School became Donlon Elementary School.

1971 – T. D. (Thomas Dickerson) Wells Intermediate School opened.^{xxii} Valley Christian Church opened an elementary school in a surplus school building. Dublin High School graduated its first senior class in June.^{xxiii}

1973 – St. Phillip Lutheran School opened in Dublin.^{xxiv}

1975 - Concerned citizens started the Dublin Historical Preservation Association (DHPA) in order to save the original Murray School (located then on Dublin Canyon Road) which was at risk due to highway construction. Caltrans donated the building to DHPA. It was moved to stand next to old St. Raymond's Church near the Dublin Pioneer Cemetery. The area is now the Dublin Heritage Park & Museums.

1979 – Dublin Elementary School closed.^{xxv}

1982 – Dublin became a city. Valley Christian Church opened a high school on its campus.

1983 – Fallon Elementary School closed.^{xxvi}

1986 - St. Raymond's Catholic Church opened an elementary school at their campus on Shannon Way.

1988 – Murray School District ended. The elementary and high schools unified into a new district, the Dublin Unified School District. Fallon School converted into district offices.^{xxvii} Lydiksen and Donlon elementary schools became part of the Pleasanton Unified School District.

1997 – Dublin Elementary School opened.^{xxviii}

2000 – James Witt Dougherty Elementary School opened.

2003 - J. R. Cronin School closed. Valley Continuation High School moved into the campus.

2005 – Eleanor Murray Fallon Middle School opened.

2007 – John Green Elementary School opened.

2009 – Nielsen Elementary School closed.^{xxix}

2014 – Harold William Kolb Elementary School opened.

2015 – Dublin Unified School District had 9,958 students in 11 schools (six elementary, two middle, one comprehensive high school and one alternative high school).^{xxx} Jose Maria Amador Elementary School opened.
